The Certificate of Accreditation reads in part, "This is to certify that Mountain Top University, Ibafo, Ogun State, having satisfied all the requirements laid down in the Institute's Guidelines for Accreditation of Accounting/Accountancy Programmes in Tertiary Institutions, has been accorded an Accredited Status by the Coun-

cil of the Institute".

The accreditation is valid for four (4) academic sessions beginning from 2019/2020 to 2022/2023. This implies that all Accounting graduates of Mountain Top University from the listed sessions will enjoy exemptions in many of the professional examinations of the Institute. This will make it quicker and easier for MTU graduates to become Chartered Accountants.

MTU CELEBRATES WORLD BOOK AND COPYRIGHT DAY 2021 IN STYLE

A ceremony to commemorate the 2021 World Book Day was put together by the Library Department of Mountain Top University under the able leadership of the University Librarian, Dr Mrs Helen Akinade, on the 23rd of April, 2021. World Book Day is a day set aside globally to celebrate books and authors and to encourage people to read the works and writings of many writers both for pleasure and for the advancement of knowledge. According to available information, 23rd of April was chosen by UNESCO as the day for the celebration because it coincides with the death anniversary of great writers such as William Shakespeare, Miguel de Cervantes, Inca Garcilaso de la Vega, among others. Some prominent authors were also born on same day.

In his opening address, the Vice Chancellor, Mountain Top University, Professor Elijah Ayolabi, encouraged participants to read books. According to him, "book is a door to knowledge and reading will contribute to social development". As a mental process, reading makes society develop. He noted that technological advancement has reduced interest in physical reading among today's youths. This is because they have access to mobile phones and other communication devices which affords them the opportunity to read online.

The topic of the day's lecture is Plagiarism and Copyright in Academic Writing and was delivered by Dr. Ifeoma Ann Oluwasemilore of the Faculty of Law, University of Lagos. The Vice-Chancellor was happy about the topic as he explained how technological advancement has made copy and paste more pronounced among today's authors. He said that the re-

production of another person's work in whatever form without the person's approval is an intellectual theft and a crime which must be resisted by all. He, therefore, using 2 Timothy 2:15 - "Study to show thyself approved unto God....." urged all to take reading very seriously pointing out that all teachers, librarians

and all of us should be sources of information to our children.

A short video on book was shown to the audience and the learning point is 'Small thing, big idea'. The general idea was to illustrate how powerful a book is in evoking thoughts, ideas and memories in the mind of the reader, just by merely reading it or even glancing at it.

At this juncture, the guest speaker, Dr. Ifeoma Ann Oluwasemilore of the Faculty of Law, University of Lagos was invited to the podium and her citation was read to the audience by the moderator, Dr Mary Omosebi. Thereafter, she came up to speak on the topic of the day – "Plagiarism and Copyright in Academic Writing".

To start with, Dr. Oluwasemilore informed the participants that internet has brought the subject of Copyright to the forefront. She said Copyright is a genre of Intellectual Property that must be protected by law.

HIGHLIGHTS OF THE GUEST SPEAKER'S LECTURE

- Copyright is the protection of expressed ideas that are fixed in a tangible medium
- It has two elements – Expression and Originality
- The focus on originality is the reason why works that seem similar to existing works can enjoy Cop-

right protection, as long as they are the original work of their creators

- Intellectual Property Rights are the rights awarded by society to individual's Copyright, Trademark, Patent, Industrial Designs, Trade Secrets. They are protected under the Common Law
- Intellectual Property can be dealt with just like any other property right.
- It allows owners to get benefit from their work or investment.
- Eligible for protection under the Copyright Act 1998 Amended are Literary works, Musical works, Sound recordings, Broadcast and Cinematographic Films, Photographs, Map and Technical Drawing Sculpture etc.
- Registration is not a precondition for Copyright protection.
- The creators of work protected by Copyright and their heirs and successors (Right holders) have certain rights under the Copyright Law.
- The economic rights relating to Copyright are of limited duration from death to 70 years after the inventor's death.
- The person or people who create original work own(s) the Copyright. The exception is in the case of media houses.
- Plagiarism entails copying someone else's work and taking credit for it as your own original work.
- Copyright infringement entails using another person's work and not paying for it or secure his authorization.
- Examples of Plagiarism are copy and paste, imitating reasoning style, switching words.
- Copyright is not an infringement when it falls under 'Fair Dealing', or when the original creator has permitted its use with an 'Open License'
- Plagiarism is a common occurrence in the academic environment all over the world because of the

pressure in our society which does not give room for originality.

- Plagiarism has grave consequences as it is regarded as theft and nobody will like to hire an employee that is capable of stealing from them. Also, it can easily be detected with the aid of a Plagiarism Checker.
- In conclusion, the guest speaker enjoined all the participants to, as much as possible be original in their intellectual works.

In his closing remarks, the Vice Chancellor, Prof. Elijah Ayolabi, appreciated the guest speaker for the eye-opening and enlightening lecture. He sincerely thanked her for exposing participants to their rights that they were unaware of.

The celebration was brought to a close with a closing prayer said by the University Bursar, Mr. Shola Olagundoye.

The beautifully designed World Book Day cake was cut and there was group photographs and refreshments.

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
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EMPOWERED TO EXCEL!

DR. BOLANLE F. OLADEJO DELIVERS THE 3RD CBAS MONTHLY STAFF SEMINAR

Dr. Bolanle Fausat Oladejo, a visiting lecturer in the Department of Mathematics and Computer Science, delivered her paper at the 3rd edition of the monthly seminar



series of the College of Basic and Applied Sciences (CBAS) on Thursday 22nd April, 2021. She is an Artificial Intelligence expert and a former Acting Head, Department of Computer Science, University of Ibadan. In addition, she is currently a team member of the African Computational Sciences Centre for Health and Development -ACSC4HD (A collaborative institute between University College London, London and University of Ibadan, Nigeria)

The University Don presented an educative and mind-blowing seminar titled, "Capitalization of Technological Innovations and Management- a Panacea for Realizing Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs)". Dr. B. F. Oladejo in her down to earth lecture, highlighted some developmental constraints that have been impeding achievement of the SDGs such as slower and unequal economic growth, natural disaster, security and data gap. She



adequately explained how the SDGs can be attained if top management/leadership apply strategic monitoring, controls and evaluation method as well as Knowledge Management (KM) strategies to preserve scientific innovations and computational

techniques such as artificial intelligence (AI), machine learning and smart technologies among others. She reiterated that attainment of the SDGs will be possible through a triple helix approach, by harnessing the leadership (management)

technology and partnership. Furthermore, she gave practical example of how application of KM with the development of AI diagnostic system for malaria detection (automated robots) at ACSC4HD which will scale up detection of malaria thereby averting child mortality in malaria endemic regions.

The exciting seminar stimulated quite a number of



questions which the audience asked during the question-and-answer segment. Professor Ayoola P. Olalusi, Dean, CBAS who was present at the seminar congratulated Dr. B. F. Oladejo for the enlightening and well-presented seminar. Dr. S. O. Kareem (Chairman of the CBAS Seminar and Annual Lecture Committee) who moderated the seminar gave the closing remarks and stated that the next edition will be delivered by the Department of Food Science and Technology. Both academic and non-academic staff of CBAS were present at the seminar. Indeed, the seminar was enlightening and showed a high prospect for realization of SDGs especially in developing countries through technological innovations with Knowledge management strategies.

YOUR HEALTH IS IN YOUR HANDS & THE MALARIA CHALLENGE

Two key events usually mark the Health calendar internationally, in the month of April - with deference to the World Health Organization (W.H.O).

These are:

- > WORLD HEALTH DAY on April 7, and;
- > WORLD MALARIA DAY on April 25 .

World Health Day is celebrated each year, on April 7, to raise awareness on health . The theme of this year's celebration was "Building a fairer , healthier world".

World Malaria Day is celebrated each year, on April 25, to spread awareness about malaria disease and to promote efforts to prevent malaria. The theme for 2021 was "Reaching the Zero malaria target". The title of my article in this month's bulletin was chosen to key into the respective themes mentioned above .

We can only build a "fairer, healthier world" - by taking personal responsibility on our health . In other words - 'YOUR HEALTH IS IN YOUR HANDS' . How do we go about doing this :

1) We must charge ourselves to give the utmost importance to our health at all times and in all circumstances. Our well-being is dependent on good health.

2) Obedience to the word of God is paramount and NON-NEGOTIABLE to sound health .

Hear these , from the scriptures ;

Exodus 23:25 - "And ye shall serve the LORD your God , and he shall bless thy bread , and thy water ; and I WILL TAKE SICKNESS AWAY FROM THE MIDST OF THEE". (emphasis mine)

Proverbs 4:20-22 - "My son , attend to my words , incline thine ear unto my sayings. Let them not depart from thine eyes; keep them in the midst of thine heart. For they are LIFE UNTO THOSE THAT FIND THEM, and HEALTH TO ALL THEIR FLESH". (emphasis mine)

Proverbs 3:7-8 - "Be not wise in thine own eyes : fear the LORD, and depart from evil. IT SHALL BE HEALTH TO THY NAVEL, and MARROW TO

THY BONES. (emphasis mine)

3)A Nutritious feeding habits must be maintained: more of plant-based than animal-based. Let your meals be laden with fruits that are in SEASON and always in season, legumes, cereals, nuts, and vegetables. Fruits are rich in vitamins and minerals , and these help to ' mop up' FREE RADICALS (which cause harmful oxidation) - that find their way into our bodies from the environment - and are carcinogenic (causes cancer) . A word of caution to DIABETICS, on fruits intake - be wary of glucose-rich fruits, as this could worsen your blood glucose control. Therefore, consult your Doctor for appropriate fruits to take.

4) Adequate rest and sleep is an immunity booster. SLEEP YOUR BRAIN YOUNGER ! Do go over my articles on sleep, in the November & December 2020 bulletins, again .

5) Flee and say NO to alcohol and smoking . These have damaging effects on vital organs of the body. They have also been implicated in many cancers affecting humans .

6) Regular, moderate exercise , at least three days in a week, has been shown to improve mental alertness and promote overall well-being. A word of caution: Do not 'overdo' exercise on a single day Learn to listen to your body! If you start feeling awkward and dizzy, then stop and rest or 'call it a day'.

7) Don't be overwhelmed by Stress! Do go over my last month's article (March 2021) -titled STRESSED? - DON'T BUCKLE UNDER THE STRAIN/PRESSURE.

8) Drink enough water everyday - at least 6 sachets (50cl) or 4 bottles (75cl). 'Soft/'carbonated/'sugar-sweetened' drinks, should NOT be a SUBSTITUTE to water after meals. Water cleanses and detoxifies the body of harmful substances .

9) Maintain a sound and positive mental health

The Malaria Challenge

My journalistic instinct tracked the following news as reported in the print , electronic and social media , with respect to this year's World Malaria Day .

- Nigeria accounts for 23% of global malaria deaths, according to the Federal Government (The Nation Newspaper , 26/04/2021).

- 700,000 persons diagnosed with malaria annually in Lagos , according to Professor Akin Abayomi - Commissioner of Health (The Vanguard , 26/04/2021) .

- Malaria causes over 400,000 deaths each year globally.(source : W.H.O)

- Malaria kills over 270,000 Children every year - with most deaths from Africa .(source : W.H.O)

- About 229 million cases of clinical malaria were reported in 2019 (source: W.H.O)

The Burden of Malaria Fever

Malaria is a deadly , but preventable and curable disease . It is caused by the protozoan parasite - Plasmodium . It is transmitted from person to person through the bite of ' female anopheles mosquitoes' , through its bites via blood meals .

Africa accounts for VERY HIGH TRANSMISSION RATES , with peaks during the rainy season . This is explained by the fact that the 'vector' (the female anopheles mosquitoes) , are afforded opportunity for breeding in pools of water and ponds .

- > Clinical features for uncomplicated malaria include fever , vomiting , chills, headache , joint aches, loss of appetite , sore throat , body weakness and cough plus other vague symptoms.

- > Poorly- treated Malaria or wrongly diagnosed malaria or patients presenting late , can progress to

Complicated malaria , with features as high grade fever , convulsion , headache , profuse vomiting , stooling , inability to stand , sit or walk , chills and rigours , and other laboratory tests abnormalities .

- > Prompt diagnosis and treatment is crucial to averting progression to complicated malaria and its sequelae .

Prevention of Malaria

- Best form of prevention is preventing mosquito bites ! This may not be possible in the tropics, where Malaria is ENDEMIC , that is, always with us.

- Seasonal malaria chemoprophylaxis , in which oral anti-malarial drugs are given usually before the onset of the rainy season .

- Use of insect repellent on exposed skin , before sleeping at night .

- Sleeping under long lasting insecticide treated nets . This is highly recommended for Children and pregnant women .

- Wearing of long-sleeved shirts and long trousers.

- Sleeping in screened rooms (with windows and entrance doors covered with mosquito nets)

Control measures

- Use of insecticides to kill the mosquitoes.

- Environmental sanitation by clearing of bush around residential buildings and offices ; proper disposal of refuse ; not allowing refuse containers/bins to be overfilled before evacuation.

- Regular fumigation of hostels, chalets, camps , quarters , stagnant ponds and pools of water.
