The venue was the grand, exquisite multi-purpose hall of the University. The date was the 20th of May 2021. Looking around the beautiful surrounding made more appealing by the lush, green grass, the convivial atmosphere betrayed a joyous occasion. As students, staff, and dignitaries began to arrive, it became obvious that an occasion of great importance was about to commence. Shortly afterwards, the multi-purpose hall was filled. It was the 6th Matriculation ceremony of the University. The joy on the faces of the matriculating students told the whole

story. Unfortunately, their parents were not around to share in their joy and celebration. Not because the parents didn't want to come. Their absence was in line with the covid-19 protocol strictly observed within the University. The parents were asked to join and follow up on the occasion via various online platforms that were provided by the University.

At exactly 10 am, the occasion commenced with a short prayer said by the University Chaplain, Pst Olumide Adesina. Present at the commencement of the occasion were the Vice-

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Chancellor, Professor Elijah Ayolabi, the Registrar, Mr Olufemi Oyewole, the Vice-Chancellor of Landmark University, Professor Adeniyi Olayanju, and other principal officers of the University. The Chancellor, Dr Daniel K. Olukoya was ably represented.

In his opening address, the Chancellor stated that in its six years of establishment, MTU has achieved its objective of maintaining an uninterrupted academic calendar, free from all the anomalies that befall the Nigerian university system. According to him, "Over the years, there have been different stories about why youths are not able to get the kind of education they deserve. Today, I am glad that the vision is positively materializing and has been acclaimed by the whole world". The Chancellor went on to encourage all the matriculating students to work hard, pray fervently and remain focused to actualize their dreams in the University.

On his part, the Vice-Chancellor, Professor Elijah

Ayolabi, congratulated all the matriculating students and officially admitted them into the University. He assured the students of uninterrupted academic calendar and world-class facilities. In his words, "having been admitted to this great university, you are on your way to the top. It is therefore important that you avail yourself of this wonderful opportunity and maximize all the potential that abound in this University. As students of this University, you are dear to our hearts. Your academic welfare is paramount to us. We recognize the importance of a good environment and accommodation in the learning process. For this reason, our university has one of the best student-friendly environment in Nigeria. Also, our hostels are top level. We have adequate, well-spaced classrooms for your lectures. Every department has the necessary equipment and infrastructure to aid your learning and other practical engagements. Please kindly avail yourself of these opportunities".

The Registrar of the University, Mr Femi Oyewole, performed his key function at the event by administering the matriculation oath to the students at which the auditorium erupted into joyous cheers from the matriculants. The ceremony was also covered by reputable media houses in Nigeria among them Punch Newspapers, Vanguard Newspapers and Sun Newspapers. The increased number of admitted students to the University is a clear indication of how the Mountain Top University education is highly sought after. It is believed that at the next matriculation, a higher number of candidates will be part of it.

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Mountain Top University Partners With Landmark University on Research and Agricultural Development

In line with the demands of the Sustainable Development Goal number 17 – Partnership for the Goals – Mountain Top University, Ibafo partners with Landmark University, Omu-Aran, Kwara State to foster mutual relations and collaborations in research and agriculture. This is expected to advance the two universities towards their goals of attaining greater heights in world universities' ranking and achieving their maximum potentials.

The two universities signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) in a ceremony at Mountain Top University on the 19th of May, 2021. In his speech, the Vice-Chancellor of Mountain Top University, Professor Elijah Ayolabi, appreciated the Vice-Chancellor of Landmark University, Professor Adeniyi Olayanju for his commitment towards the partnership exhibited by his physical presence at the occasion despite his tight schedules. He also stated that the two universities share many things in common and believed that together they could do greater things.

The Vice-Chancellor, Landmark University, Professor Adeniyi Olayanju, did not come alone. He came in the company of his Director of Internationalisation Office, Linkages and Grant Management, Dr Adeolu Adeniran and University's Legal Officer, Barrister Ms Funmi Olatunji. In his speech, Professor Adeniyi Olayanju, explained that the partnership is expected to boost the international ranking and visibility of both universities. He further reiterated that he chose MTU for this collaboration because the two universities share similar visions and aspirations citing Amos 3:3 - "Can two walk together, except they be agreed - to buttress his point.

The Vice-Chancellor also stated that his visit to Mountain Top University has opened his eyes to some beautiful features of the University, which according to him, he would like to replicate in his university. He encouraged MTU to establish Sus-

Responding, the Acting Director, Centre for Research Innovation and Collaborations (CRIC), Dr Edwin Ofudje, appreciated the VC of Landmark University and his team for coming and expressed his desire to also emulate some giant strides in Landmark University, especially the SDG Exhibition Centre and replicate same in MTU. He extolled the leadership qualities of the Vice-Chancellor of Mountain Top University, Professor Elijah Ayolabi, and thanked him for his support and encouragement towards the Centre.

At the end of the talks, the two Vice-Chancellors signed the MoU in the presence of their teams members. As is the tradition of Mountain Top University, beautiful branded gift items were presented to the visitors.

Later in the evening of the same day, a cocktail dinner was held to celebrate the new partnership. The VC of Landmark University, Professor Adeniyi Olayanju and his team members, including MTU Management staff, were treated to a sumptuous meal with good music by the students of Every Student a Musician (ESM) programme of the University. The ambience of the MTU Organ House provided a suitable venue for the occasion. In all, it was a beautiful experience.

Management Organises Leadership Training for Students' Representative Council (SRC) Members

The management of Mountain Top University organized a leadership training programme for the Student's Representative Council (SRC) members in preparation for the commencement of the second semester of the 2020/2021 academic session. The event, which began on the 3rd and ended on the 7th of May, 2021, was held at the College of Basic and Applied Sciences Conference room. The leadership training was to help train the students' representatives on what their responsibilities are to the school and the students and to guide them on how to function properly in their various positions.

Various people were called in to speak to the students on various topics. First, it was Mrs Abimbola Joshua, who represented the University Chaplain, Pastor Olumide Adesina, and taught on "Salvation for True Leadership". She cited examples of people who made great impact and used these scriptures – Exodus 14:13-17, John 8:32 and Acts 4: 10-12 – to buttress her points. She explained brokenness and how it reveals potentials. The Ag Dean of Students' Affairs, Dr. Moses Abiala, then discussed "The Call to Leadership" and what is expected of the students' representatives and explained the mission, vision and acceptable practices in the University. The Dean of the College of Basic and Applied Sciences, Prof.

Ayo Olalusi, also dwelled on how to bring out your best as a good leader. 'Leaders do not beg, they give', he stated while buttressing his points with the following scriptures – 1 Tim 4:12, Matt 22:14. He also enumerated some red flags for leaders as side talks, pomposity, seeking revenge, seeking attention and pointing accusing fingers to others.

The second day started with the talk by Dr. Christiana Ayolabi, who enlightened the SRC members on "*Unholy Pairing-relationships and Associations: Present and Future Implications*". She stated that healthy relationships that are based on mutual respect, trust, honesty & fairness are the best. Scriptures for her talk were taken from 2 Samuel 13:1-15 and Romans 12:1-2. The next facilitator for the day was the pioneer President of the Students' Representative Council of MTU, in the person of Samuel Aiyeyun. He spoke on leadership mechanism and CART which according to him has four parts: HED - Highly Effective Doer, LED - Less Effective Doer, PTS - Potential Trouble Source and SP - Suppressive Person. He rounded off by encouraging the students to stand firm and remain focused.

The University Registrar, Mr Olufemi Oyewole, began the next session with "*Leadership Responsibilities and Excellence*". He quoted John Maxwell - "leadership is influence, nothing more, nothing less". He then spoke on essential responsibilities that build effective teams saying that a leader must not judge, but listen and take responsibility for building excellent leadership.

The third day started with the talk by Pastor Etomi Edwin, the Senior Regional Overseer of Mountain of Fire and Miracles Ministries, Abuja. He dissected "*Leadership Skills & Development: Opportunities & Challenges*". He drew his text from Acts 6:1, Ephesians 4:11 and Matt 15:1-3. According to him, an eagle leader is a visionary leader. Leadership skills in-

clude: culture of gratitude, principle of delegation, conflict & time management, confidence, adaptability among others and few of the challenges are failure to communicate, lack of clear vision, organizational culture, poor collaboration & execution and lack of leadership skills.

The next facilitator was the immediate past President of the Students' Representative Council, Tobi Olusanya. She spoke on how to manage time, academics and leadership position to attain a first class degree. She began by reading Proverbs 3:5 and Proverbs 24:10. She encouraged the student leaders to put God first, set goals and be solution oriented. She gave them an acronym - SMART which stands for Specific, Measurable, Achievable/Attainable, Realis-

tic and Time bound – to guide them in setting their goals in life. According to her, 'Excuse is the language of a weak person, you need to compartmentalize your life and do mind mapping to avoid giving excuses'.

Dr. Omokehinde, Sub-dean Students' Affairs and Acting HOD of Accounting Department, talked on *Leadership Team Spirit*. Mr Samson Oladipo discussed practical guidelines & time management for effective delivery as a leader and read from Heb 5:1-4 and Habakkuk 2:2. He mentioned three key leadership offices, which are - priesthood office, prophetic office and the kingship office. According to him, leadership is by divine appointment, so to whom much is given, much is also expected.

The 4th day kicked off with Pastor Emmanuel Oladimeji, the International Headquarters Youth Church's Pastor. He addressed conflict resolutions strategies amongst youths & teenagers for intelligent leaders. According to him, a great leader is determined by

"IMPACT". He cited Matthew 5:9 and gave twelve things an individual can be to his/her generation – deficit, liability, blessing, curse, transformer, poison, role model (positive), contributor, solution, consumer, a guiding light and a nonentity. Some of his powerfully impactful statements include: 'Be sensitive to your passion, it is your drive; 'until you can solve problems for people, they won't respect you'; 'some conflicts need crisis to solve them'; if conflict is not resolved, it will be fed and then explode; conflict is an essential part of our responsibility, a reality; 'If you are not disciplined, you will be disciplined'; 'every conflict has a password, ask for the password and decide the issue'; 'Do not turn a special instruction into a general practice'.

The sessions came to a climax when the Vice-Chancellor, Professor Elijah Ayolabi stepped on the dais for his talk. He talked on wisdom for the present and future/upcoming generation. According to him, "You have a vision when you are awake/alive, you dream when sleeping". He encouraged the students not to be miracle seekers rather miracle workers, citing 1 Timothy 4:12. He further admonished them to be disciplined in time management and always do the right thing at the right time pointing out that what you can do today, do not leave until tomorrow. He also told the students to have personal vision and mission and stop following people about but create their own individual path and excel in it and above all be committed, consistent and disciplined.

The leadership training was rounded off with fasting and prayer on the last day. There was also a prayer vigil on the same day superintended by the University Chaplain, Pastor Olumide Adesina. It is believed that the newly appointed SRC members have been greatly impacted and are ready to exhibit excellent leadership skills in the performance of their duties as the current students leaders in the University.

- MTU Centre for Gender Studies Holds an Eye-Opening Webinar

In this age and time when many people, including the government, are taking gender equality and women inclusion more seriously, a lot of educative seminars and workshops are being organized to train women and also to show them opportunities they can explore towards realizing their dreams and God-given potentials.

In that regard, Mountain Top University Centre for Gender Studies, under the able leadership of the Gender Desk Officer, Dr Nelly Acha Ndukwe, in collaboration with the Organisation for Women in Science for the Developing World (OWSD), Lagos branch organized an enlightenment seminar.

The programme, which took place on the 6th of May, 2021, was facilitated by three wonderful women who have distinguished themselves in their various fields and are a beacon of light for other women to follow. The first facilitator was Dr Cynthia Ibeto, a Senior Lecturer at the University of Nigeria, Nsukka and the National Coordinator Women in Chemistry (Nigeria). She spoke on **Available Grants for Women Scientists**. Her presentation was very rich as she provided the titles and links to some of the grants that are available for women, which are, most times, under-utilized due to ignorance and lack of exposure among the women.

The second facilitator was Dr Yemisi A. Jeff-Agboola, a Senior Lecturer at the University of Medical Sciences,

Ondo, a Fullbright Scholar and the President/Founder of VOWDA, an NGO. She spoke on **NGO and Community Development Grants**. The third facilitator was Dr Temi O. Onuminya, a Senior Lecturer at the University of Lagos, a Darwin Scholar and a

serial grant recipient, who is actively involved in youth development. Dr Onuminya spoke on **Grants for Girl-Child Education/Development in Africa**.

The Vice-Chancellor, Professor Elijah Ayolabi was on ground to declare the webinar open and welcomed the guest speakers to the event. Other Principal Officers of the University – the Registrar, Mr Femi Oyewole, the Bursar, Mr Shola Olagundoye and the University Librarian, Dr Mrs Helen Akinade – also gave their full support. The webinar was conducted using the zoom platform and it recorded over eighty participants, including MTU staff and those from other institutions.

Other speakers, who took their time to introduce the students into the happenings in their units include the Bursar, Mr Shola Olagundoye, the University Librarian, Dr Mrs Helen Akinade and heads/representatives of many other units or centres in the University.

There was a question and answer session after each presentation during which the students were given the opportunity to ask questions about any issue or area in the University. Workaholics, Beware! Don't burn your candle at both ends

In Philippians 2: 25-27,30 (Contemporary English Version), Apostle Paul wrote:

(25) "I think I ought to send my dear friend Epaphroditus back to you. He is a follower and a worker and a soldier of the Lord, just as I am. You sent him to look after me, (26) but now he is eager to see you. He is worried, because you heard he was SICK. (27) In fact, he was VERY SICK and ALMOST DIED. But God was kind to him, and also to me, and he kept me from being burdened down with sorrow. ... (30) He ALMOST DIED WORKING for Christ,..." (Emphasis mine).

In the scriptures quoted above, Epaphroditus, a Minister, that is, Man of God, came very close to death! The cause of this condition was that of OVERWORK in the service of the Lord and His people.

Let me say this from the outset of this article, for the sake of clarification, that God instituted the concept of work right from the beginning of creation. God the Father WORKED to put things in place and in order. God the Son - Our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ, also WORKED with all vigour during His earthly ministry.

However, God the Father and God the Son, created time for rest. Genesis 2:2 says, "And on the seventh day God ended his WORK which he had made; and he RESTED on the seventh day from all his work which he had made". Jesus Christ, on a number of occasions separated himself apart, from His disciples and the multitudes, to rest .

No doubt, it is work that uplifts one under the mighty hands of God and believers MUST of a Necessity be HARDWORKING. As a matter of fact, Laziness/Indolence/Mediocrity should be avoided like a plague. Apostle Paul said in 1st Thessalonians 4:11 - "And that ye study to be quiet, and to do your own business, and to WORK with your own hands, as we commanded you". Also in 2nd Thessalonians 3:10 - "For even when we were with you, this we commanded you, that if any should not WORK, neither should he eat".

The so-called 'rat-race' and the fast-paced life we have found ourselves, has subtly brought the phenomenon of WORKAHOLISM, which is regarded as an addiction - "an uncontrollable need to work incessantly". This is an obsession, a compulsion.

Workaholics have an obsessive work mentality. They are characterised by having an inner compul-

sive drive to work hard, thinking about work constantly, and feeling guilty and restless when they are not working.

Workaholics may "burn the candle at both ends" - an English idiom, meaning to WORK LONG HOURS WITHOUT REST. It means to exhaust oneself by working too much, going to bed late and getting up early. The 'candle' in question symbolizes one's life force and 'burning the candle at both ends' meant the use of one's life force too quickly.

Workaholism often goes hand in hand with working long hours, but the two are distinct. Workaholics are mentally pre-occupied with work. They are not satisfied and find it difficult to detach from work. They go to bed thinking about work/job. They are anxious and find it difficult to sleep.

Those who work long hours on the other hand are fulfilled when they finish work for the day, usually have time for rest and fall asleep easily. In the morning, feels refreshed for a new work day.

Workaholics are at risk/predisposed to the following health problems:

> chronic sleep problems;

> high blood pressure, high blood glucose, high blood lipids, chronic uncontrolled blood pressure;

> cardiovascular (heart & blood vessels) diseases;

> physical /emotional exhaustion;

> chronic fatigue syndrome; etc

Curtailing Workaholism

Regain control over your work behaviour; set clear rules over how many hours you will work each day. Also psychologically detach from work by being involved in recreational activities outside your work schedule.

Summary

Too much work and too little time for rest and relaxation will take its toll upon one's health.
