MTU CONCLUDES TEST 3 AND SESSIONAL EXAMINATION FOR 300 & 400 LEVEL STUDENTS

The journey of a thousand miles begins with a step, says an adage. This saying is justified in the lives of the present 400 level students who commenced their academic journey in MTU four years ago. Regardless of the challenges and obstacles against the completion of their study due to COVID –19 pandemic, they were able to resume on the 2nd of October, 2020 to complete their second semester study and examination. It would be recalled that the second semester lectures were conducted online as a result of the lockdown period.

Upon hearing the news of resumption, the students were full of excitement and a sense of relief. Only the 300 and 400 level students of the two colleges - CBAS and CHMS - were allowed to resume in compliance with the National Centre for Disease Control

(NDDC) guidelines and protocols to curb the spread of Covid-19.

Before the commencement of the examination, two weeks revision was done for the students to refresh their memories. All hands were on deck on the part of the lecturers to make sure these students were thoroughly drilled within the spate of two weeks before their examination.

After the two weeks revision, Test 3 was conducted to augment for the previous tests (Test 1 & 2) done virtually during lockdown and the students conducted themselves appropriately.

Amidst the pandemonium, arson, chaos and the security threats in the country as a result of the #EndSARS protest, the second semester examination of 2019/2020 academic session for MTU 300 and 400 level students commenced on the 19th of October and ended

successfully on the 22nd of October, 2020. The 400 level students were especially grateful to God Almighty that saw them through the challenging times and the threats to a successful completion of their academic career at MTU.

Some of the 400 level students that the editorial crew interacted with appreciated the management of MTU and the entire staff for their diligence and resilience during the just concluded second semester examination. They commended their commitment and zeal for being able to successfully wade through the #EndSARS protest in order to discharge their duties seamlessly.

DIGITALISATION AND TRAINING OF STAFF ON APER FORM

In line with the demands of the times we are in and in compliance with the dictates of the digital age, Mountain Top University Annual Performance Evaluation Review (APER) exercise for the year 2020 was done digitally.

As a way to carry everybody

along, a training exercise was conducted for both academic staff and non-academic staff in the University to prepare them for the new development.

At the time of this report, most of the staff members have completed their sections in the APER form. The Heads of Departments, Deans

of Colleges and the Registrar also have their parts in the entire process. It is hoped that this process will minimise cost, reduce waste, remove errors and cut down on time loss thereby making the entire process more efficient.

#ENDSARS Protests and the Future of our Youths

Recently, Nigeria witnessed enormous deviance by restive youths protesting police brutality. In particular, the youths were more concerned with the unconscionable acts of brutality by SARS, a police department in Nigeria. Using the hashtag #ENDSARSNOW, millions of youths across the country marched to the streets demanding the immediate proscription of the offending police department. On various platforms, through the social media, youths recounted sordid experiences in the hands of officers who served in SARS, both at the federal and state levels. Some reports had it that SARS officers arrested youths indiscriminately, tortured, and robbed them of their personal belongings. Video clips that trended on social media revealed some SARS officers brutalizing innocent youths simply because they drove exotic cars, carried laptops or dressed in the current trending apparel. Youths who stood up against SARS officers were either killed or taken to a designated cell for torturing and prolonged detention. During the #ENDSARS protests, Jimoh Isiaka, a youth, was shot in Ogbomosho by a police officer. After Jimoh's death, Nigerian youths felt that it was one death too many. More provoking was what

seemed to be the insensitivity of the IG and the police hierarchy after many complaints about the dastardly acts of police officers across the country.

Besides police and SARS brutality, the youths were also protesting against various anomalous conditions in the country. These led to the use of other hashtags such as #ENDBADGOVERNANCE, #ENDIMPUNITY. As the protests



across the country gathered momentum, the government and leadership class were taken aback because it was unlike Nigerian youths to raise their voices against an oppressive, exploitative system. For too long, Nigerian youths swallowed all manner of vulgarity from the government. The youths watched in utter dismay as the leadership class vanquished their future through mindless recycling of leadership which saw people straddle political and public offices for a long time. The youths seemed to have been sedated by an unseen

force as they watched their country excel in poverty, suffering, and anguish. Therefore, the #ENDSARS protests across the country provided an opportunity for the youths to ventilate their latent frustration. They gave a five-point demand which must be addressed by the government before they would quit the streets and abandon the protests.

Following the demands of the youths, the government, in a rare show of empathy and responsibility, reacted by proscribing SARS, the offending police department. In addition to that, the government also acceded to all the demands outlined by the youths. Unfortunately, the protests later turned violent and recorded tragic experiences starting from Lagos. In a bid to stop the protest, armed soldiers went to the Lekki area of Lagos to shoot and injure many of the peaceful protesters. Right now, it is uncertain how many people lost their lives during the shooting by the soldiers at the Lekki Toll Gate.

The events of the protests in Lekki have rattled the entire country. There are submissions and questions as to what exactly took place there. The Lagos State government has since set up a panel of

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inquiry to investigate what happened at the Lekki Toll Gate. While many people commended the youths for successful protests, for bringing the attention of the government to deteriorating aspects of the country, many people have also blamed them for lacking leadership which was responsible for the violent dimension the protests eventually took across the country.

The recent nation-wide protests by Nigerian youths have reverberated across the country and indeed, all over the world. Everybody is aware that Nigerian youths exist and are ready to stake a claim in

the affairs of their country. Given the nature of the protests and the attendant global acclaim, Nigeria's political class can no longer dismiss Nigerian youths with a wave of the hand. The youths have made far-reaching claims towards 2023 general elections. They want to be involved in the leadership apparatus of the country. They want to reclaim their country from obviously tired minds. They want to stir the country to a positive, virile direction which is what youth symbolizes. Many people have advised the youths to form a political party of their own because the two leading parties, APC and PDP may not provide the kind of progressive plat-

forms they seek. Indeed, it appears that the #ENDSARS protest has opened a new vista for the emergence and discovery of youths in Nigeria's political and social participation. It is left to be seen if the youths will sustain the current energy with which they protested in the last few weeks. If they do, then it means that a new Nigeria is in the offing. If they allow themselves to be compromised and divided, then it means that all the efforts and energy expended on the protests were a waste of time.





